DR. CHARLES O'MAHONY

Charles is a lecturer at the University of Galway's School of Law, specialising in disability law and policy, mental health law and policy, and allied areas. He uses the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) as a framework in his research, identifying gaps in existing law and policy, and to identify reforms that align with international human rights standards.

He was Head of the School of Law from 2017-2021 and served two terms as President of the Irish Association of Law Teachers (IALT). He completed a PhD at the Centre for Disability Law and Policy, the University of Galway.

Charles has worked as a legal officer for Amnesty International Ireland, and as a legal researcher for the Law Reform Commission of Ireland.





DR GERALD BARRY

Assistant Professor of Virology at University College Dublin Facilitating session on:

Dr Gerald Barry is an Assistant Professor of Virology at University College Dublin. Dr Barry qualified with a degree in Genetics from Trinity College Dublin before moving to Edinburgh University to complete a Master's and PhD in Virology. He worked in The Roslin Institute in Edinburgh following completion of his PhD, before moving to Glasgow to work in the UK's Centre for Virus Research. After 12 years in the UK, Gerald took up his position in UCD where he teaches and manages a research group studying viruses of both humans and animals. In UCD, Gerald is also the deputy director of the newly established UCD One Health Centre.



SIVE BRESNIHAN

Education and Training Co-ordinator with Comhlámh

Sive Bresnihan works in the field of non-formal education and is currently Comhlámh's Education and Training Co-ordinator. Prior to joining the organisation in 2016, she worked on development programmes in Rwanda, Zimbabwe, Sierra Leone, Kenya and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Curriculum areas for Sive include intercultural awareness, ethical communication, critical thinking, resilience and wellbeing as well as 'whole-of-organisation' approaches to engaging with (un)sustainability. Her interest is in processes that support deep, collective engagement with challenging but



vital topics.

Alongside her role in Comhlámh, Sive is a member of numerous all-Ireland training panels including the IDEA (Irish Development Education Association) Code of Good Practice Panel. Sive is a Gestalt Theatre in Education practitioner and holds an MA in International Development Studies and an MEd in Adult Education from the University of Cape Town.

She currently serves on the Boards of the European Anti-Poverty Network (EAPN) Ireland and Síolta Chroí and was adjunct lecturer in Gender and Development at the Department of International Development Studies MU between 2014 and 2017.

Alice Campari, a midwife, graduated in 2015 from the University of Milan. She has been involved in international cooperation since 2012, primarily in northern Uganda, but also in Greek refugee camps, international waters of the Mediterranean Sea, and Ethiopia.

In 2018, she completed her master's degree in "Midwifery-Led Care" at the University of Modena, with her thesis project focused on developing a cervical cancer screening initiative at Kalongo Hospital in northern Uganda. In 2019, she founded a volunteer organization called ATIM, which supports projects dedicated to women (mainly former child soldiers), street children, HIV-positive orphans, and deaf and mute children. She has been working in Ireland since 2018 at Coombe Hospital, where she is currently a Clinical Midwife Manager in the delivery suite.


